The University and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) facilitate university applications.

Students complete **one online application for up to 5 university choices.**

Application fee of £28.95 to be paid when students submit their application:


- This is waived if a student can evidence they have received free school/college meals in the last 6 years
- If a student is in receipt of the College
 Bursary, they can use that to pay the fee


In College support for students:

- Careers appointments
- Unifrog to get personal statement checked
- UCAS Teams groups full of resources
- Time during Tutor to work on applications

College internal application deadline: Friday 7th November 2025.

If students haven't met this deadline – **don't panic, hand in as soon as possible.** Their applications will still be checked and sent, but we prioritise those who met the internal deadline.

UCAS Equal Consideration Deadline: Wednesday 14th January 6pm

May – July: Offers and decisions

August: Results Day and Clearing



Consider: entry requirements, subject interest, location and career goals.

Use **UCAS Hub** (student UCAS account) to compare universities and save courses of interest, university websites and league tables.

Attend Open Days and virtual tours

Springpod have 'try before you apply' online short courses and lectures students can complete to gain insight into particular universities and subjects: <u>University Taster Search | Springpod</u>

PERSONAL STATEMENT TIPS

- **4000 characters maximum** to show their motivation and suitability for the course(s) they are applying for. Split into 3 questions:
- Why do you want to study this course or subject?
- How have your qualifications/studies helped prepare you for this course or subject?
- What else have you done outside of education, and how have these experiences been useful?

Using AI – can be a useful tool, but can't be used to write the whole thing

How you can help:

- Reflecting on activities
- Helping pull together ideas
- Proof-reading drafts



Conditional offer: based on exam results, students must achieve particular grades (e.g. BBC with a B in Psychology).

Contextual offer: if a student meets certain criteria, they can get a reduced grade offer (e.g. BCC instead of BBC).

Unconditional offer: an offer made regardless of results (sometimes after a successful interview, strong portolio or audition).

No offer: students can apply through UCAS Extra or Clearing

Students must then make a **firm** and **insurance** choice.

YOUR ROLEAS A PARENT/CARER

Be a sounding board for ideas

- university choices
- personal statement suggestions

Encourage resilience and independence, but also to access support as needed

Help with the practicalities and reinforce deadlines

Stay calm and supportive throughout the application process, but especially when:

- Offers start to come through
- Students are invited to interviews
- Results Day arrives
