

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT POLICY 2025/26

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1.0 Introduction

All COPC policies, procedures and strategies are underpinned by the College Strategy, the College Values, and the enabling themes.

The Strategic Goals of the College:

- Inspirational, aspirational and inclusive place to work and learn
- Responsive and relevant curriculum offer
- High quality teaching, learning and assessment
- Trusted partner for the communities we serve
- Stabilised and sustainable finances

Our three enabling themes:

- 1. Embrace digital technology in all we do
- 2. Beacon of sustainability
- 3. Consolidation before expansion

All of the above is to be delivered to a high standard, by sharing brilliance whilst adopting the College's core Values: Collaborate, Aspire, Respect, Empower, Support (CARES).

The City of Portsmouth College Student Code of Conduct sets out the standard of conduct the College expects of its students so that everyone can undertake their studies in a supportive and non-threatening environment. Students are expected to behave responsibility on campus and also on trips and visits associated with the College.

All students should read this document. By accepting an offer to study and enroll at the City of Portsmouth College you agree to abide by this Code of Conduct. Prior to induction, students will be asked to confirm they have read and understood this document.

2.0 Purpose

At the City of Portsmouth College, we're here to support your learning journey, whatever stage you're at. We welcome people from all backgrounds and aim to make education open to everyone in Portsmouth and beyond. To help everyone feel safe, respected, and ready to succeed, we've put together some simple rules and expectations. This Code of Conduct sets out how we can all work together in a positive way, based on the values of our college.

3.0 Aims of the Code of Conduct

To set guidelines which will help you to maintain and improve standards and protect you from criticism or misunderstanding.

To create and maintain a safe and harmonious working and learning environment in which individuals respect each other and the culture of the College.

To engage you and encourage resilience, inspirational thought and effort, instil enthusiasm in college life and enable you to take pride in your studies and learning environment.



4.0 Equity, Equality, Diversity & Inclusion

City of Portsmouth College welcomes the full participation of all members of the community and strives to provide a well-resourced and pleasant environment for study.

Within City of Portsmouth College, any form of discrimination or harassment, directly or indirectly, related to an individual's race, colour, nationality, ethnic or national origins, religion, gender, marital status, sexual orientation, or disability will not be tolerated. You are expected to treat all staff and all other students with courtesy and respect, avoiding behaviour, dress, actions, or language that may cause offence or harm to others.

Equity, Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion (EED&I) are actively championed within City of Portsmouth College. We will ensure that our people, policies, and procedures promote and support equality and diversity in the workplace and help to create an inclusive College environment for colleagues and students. Equity, Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion are central to the work of City of Portsmouth College. EEDI underpins everything we do to enable us to achieve our vision to be the 'College of Choice' for the city of Portsmouth and our region.

5.0 Student Support

The City of Portsmouth College is here to help you build the personal skills you need for work, further study, and life beyond college. We will do this by:

- Providing a clear induction that explains what behaviour is expected and what isn't allowed.
- Talking about good conduct regularly during your tutorials to help you understand and practice acceptable behaviour.
- Embedding important employability skills (like the Super 8) into your course and tutorial activities.
- Using the Student Behaviour Policy to guide and support you in following the rules, you are ready to move confidently to your next step.

6.0 Review

City of Portsmouth College's Senior Management Team [SMT] reviews its policies and procedures annually to ensure they meet the needs of all students and support a positive learning environment. This means:

- We listen to student feedback to help improve how things work.
- The rules and support systems are regularly checked and updated as needed.
- You will be informed of any important changes, so you know what to expect.



STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT PROCEDURE 2025/26

1.0 Student Code of Conduct

This Code of Conduct applies to student behaviour both inside and outside of college, including when online. It also covers any activities student might take part in such as being on the Student Council or acting as a Course Rep. The Code works alongside other college rules, policies, and any professional standards linked to your course. Students will be required to read and sign the student code of conduct at point of enrolment.

Students should read this code together with the College's policies identified below:

2.0 Behaviour and Participation

At College, we expect all students to contribute to a positive, respectful, and productive environment. These expectations are designed to help you succeed in your studies, support others, and represent the College in a way that reflects our shared values. The way you behave on site, online, and in the wider community matters.

All students are expected to:

- Always try your best. Complete work to a high standard, meet all deadlines, and make sure your work is your own. Plagiarism is not acceptable.
- Set aside time to study outside of College. Arrive to each lesson prepared and ready to learn. If you fall behind, take action. Catch up on missed work and attend any additional support sessions where appropriate.
- Complete all Directed Study, Homework, and 50/50 tasks on time. Make sure your work meets the standard expected by your teacher or tutor and reflects your best effort
- Work hard to support your own learning and that of others. Your effort helps to create a positive learning environment for everyone.
- Allow others to learn without distraction. Do not disturb lessons or cause disruption around campus.
- Take responsibility for your litter. Please ensure that paper, cardboard, bottles, cans, and plastic wastes are deposited in recycling bins situated throughout the College. Bottles, cans, and plastic containers should be rinsed clean prior to disposal. It is your responsibility to ensure that litter is disposed of appropriately. The consumption of food and drink is only permitted within designated areas.
- Do not eat during class. Only water is allowed in learning spaces. Food should be



consumed in the College's designated eating areas.

- Damage to property Any College property which is on loan to you during the course
 of your studies is your responsibility. Consequently, you may be required to repay the
 cost for any loss or damage to the property.
- Speak respectfully and use appropriate language. Avoid words or actions that could offend others. Be polite and helpful to everyone. Treat staff, students, visitors, and the wider community with respect both in person and online.
- Value and respect everyone. Embrace and include people of all backgrounds, identities, and experiences. Celebrate differences and challenge discrimination in all forms. 'Banter' that excludes, targets, or harms others is a form of bullying and will not be tolerated
- Be considerate to local residents. Don't block pavements, gather outside homes or parks, drop litter, or smoke/vape in public areas near campus.

3.0 Attendance and Punctuality

At City of Portsmouth College, good attendance and punctuality are vital to your success. Being present, on time, and prepared for all lessons and activities helps you get the most from your learning experience. Below are the key expectations to support your progress and commitment.

- Maintain a minimum attendance rate of 95%. Regular attendance is essential for your progress and success. Be committed to attending all timetabled lessons. This includes your main subjects, English and maths (if applicable).
- Arrive on time for every lesson. Being punctual shows respect and helps you stay on track. If you arrive late, knock on the classroom door and wait outside until invited in by your teacher.
- Bring all essential equipment and materials to every lesson. Be prepared with any work, books, stationery, or specialist equipment requested by your teachers.
- Attend all tutorials (PDP) and actively participate in additional learning activities. This
 includes Work Experience, Employability and Enrichment workshops/activities, and
 other events that contribute to your overall guided learning hours and beyond.
- If you are ill, ensure you make every effort to catch up on missed work, and report all absences by following the College's absence policy.
- Do not take holidays during term time. Holidays during College sessions are strongly discouraged and require prior written authorisation. Unauthorised holiday absences may be recorded as unauthorised and could affect your attendance record.

4.0 Nine Ways to be excellent

At the City of Portsmouth College, we believe that success comes from developing strong habits and attitudes. The **Nine Ways to Be Excellent** are simple but powerful steps you can take every day to make the most of your learning and reach your goals. Following these will help you build the skills and mindset needed to succeed both at college and beyond.

- 1. Be on time to all your lessons
- 2. Be Prepared
- 3. Be focused and motivated to learn
- 4. Be up for solving problems



- 5. Be resilient and adaptable
- 6. Be looking for ways to improve
- 7. Be producing top quality work
- 8. Be organised and meet your deadlines
- 9. Be committed to exceeding your targets

5.0 Safeguarding

As a student at City of Portsmouth College, safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. You are expected to contribute to a safe, respectful, and supportive environment for yourself and others by following the safeguarding expectations outlined below:

- Report any concerns about your safety or the safety of others immediately. You can speak to your personal tutor, any trusted member of staff, or the College's Safeguarding Team if you feel unsafe or are worried about someone else.
- Never engage in or tolerate bullying, harassment, or discrimination. Any incident of bullying, harassment, intimidation, threatening or violent behaviour will be fully investigated and may result in disciplinary action. This includes incidents which take place via electronic communications, e.g., social networking, text, or email.
- Respect personal boundaries and avoid any form of sexualised or harmful behaviour. Sexual violence, harassment, inappropriate jokes, comments, or gestures even if intended as a joke are serious safeguarding concerns and will be dealt with under the Student Behaviour Policy.
- All types of gambling are strictly prohibited on college premises and during any College-related activities.
- The use or possession of illicit drugs and alcohol is not tolerated on college premises. Being in possession or under the influence of either of these substances will lead to immediate suspension and initiation of student behaviour procedures, including the possibility of exclusion. Any attempts to sell illicit drugs to others on college premises will lead to immediate exclusion. The College co-operates fully with the Police.
- All types of gambling are strictly prohibited on college premises and during any College-related activities.
- Possession of an offensive weapon will lead to your immediate suspension and the initiation of student behaviour procedures, including the possibility of exclusion. The College co-operates fully with the Police.
- Understand that safeguarding applies off campus as well. Behaviour that poses a risk
 to others, even outside of college or online, may result in disciplinary action if it affects
 members of the College community.

6.0 Site Safety and Security

At City of Portsmouth College, we are committed to maintaining a safe, respectful, and inclusive learning environment for all students, staff, and visitors. As a student, you have a shared responsibility to follow College expectations, support the wellbeing of others, and behave in ways that reflect positively on our community. You must act safely in college, on off site visits and not put yourself or others at risk by your own actions.

The Health & Safety at Work Act (1974) applies to everyone who enters and uses City of Portsmouth College facilities. It is intended to protect health and to ensure personal



wellbeing and safety. Importantly, this Act requires everyone to be responsible for their own safety and for the health and safety of others. This means we all have a duty to anticipate the effects of our actions and behaviour.

- All students must wear your City of Portsmouth College student ID badge on a lanyard around your neck and keep it visible at all times while on campus or taking part in college activities, except when working in designated workshops where this may not be permitted for safety reasons. If your ID is lost or stolen, report it immediately and visit reception to purchase a replacement badge.
- Students are only permitted onsite during the College's permitted open hours. Do not enter buildings before 8.30am unless authorised and leave campus by 5pm unless engaged in a supervised activity, or evening provision offered at our North Harbour and Highbury campus.
- Do not bring unauthorised visitors onto college premises. Inform staff immediately if you see unauthorised visitors. All authorised visitors must sign in at reception and wear visible ID.
- When in workshops, training kitchens and training salons, you have a responsibility to ensure they are wearing the appropriate Personal Protective Equipment to ensure Health and Safety regulations are met.
- Only Park vehicles in designated areas. Drive safely and observe all campus speed limits. Push bicycles through the campus and use designated bike racks. E-scooters are not permitted on college premises.
- Use the designated smoking and vaping area only, located behind the student car park. Smoking or vaping elsewhere on campus is prohibited.
- Do not interfere with or damage any health and safety equipment. Familiarise yourself with emergency exits and evacuation/lockdown procedures and leave the building immediately when the fire alarm sounds. If you have mobility needs, your personal evacuation plan will be arranged with the College Health and Safety Officer.

7.0 Digital Technology and Online Behaviour

At City of Portsmouth College, you are expected to use all digital tools and online platforms responsibly, respectfully, and in line with college policies. This includes your use of the internet, social media, and College systems. Your online behaviour should uphold the values of the College community, protect your learning, and ensure the safety and wellbeing of others. Misuse of ICT can have serious consequences and will be treated as a breach of the Student Code of Conduct.

You may use the College's network and computing resources provided that you conform to user procedures and the College's Acceptable Use Policy, and you must not:

- Interfere with the normal conduct of the College's business (Don't disrupt how the College runs or how others work and learn).
- Conduct any for-profit personal business activity (Don't use College time, space, or equipment to run your own business or make money).
- Embarrass the College or a College employee, other students, or visitors
- Violate any law.
- Behave appropriately online and use digital platforms responsibly. Do not share harmful, explicit, offensive, or abusive content. Inappropriate behaviour online, including the sharing of private or explicit images, will be treated as a serious breach



of the Code of Conduct.

- Do not let anyone else use your college login details or share your password. Keep your account secure and private.
- Do not install or connect unauthorised software or devices to the College network.
- Always follow the College's IT Acceptable Use Policy and IT Services Security Policy
- Mobile Phones and Recording Devices:
 - Mobile phones must be switched off during lessons unless the teacher has specifically asked you to use them for learning.
 - o **Do not take photos, videos, or make audio recordings** of students or staff without their permission.

8.0 Artificial Intelligence

Whilst you are encouraged to utilise AI to bolster your learning, you must strictly adhere to college and awarding body assessment guidelines. AI tools must only be used where permitted by the conditions of assessment. You must be able to demonstrate that the final piece of work is the product of your own independent thinking.

You can:

- Validate Al-suggested concepts against credible sources (Remember that Al can make mistakes or be biased and provide misinformation).
- Not present Al-generated content as your own original work
- Appropriately reference Al-derived content, acknowledging that it will not be credited on its intrinsic merit.
- Provide detailed acknowledgment of AI tools utilised, ensuring the retention of evidence of their usage.

You should consult with their teacher to ensure and obtain specific advice on the use of AI including ethical use and when to declare this.

You cannot:

- Do not copy or slightly change bits of AI-generated text and say it's yours.
- Do not copy or rewrite whole answers from AI as your own work.
- Do not use AI to do parts of an assignment if it means the work isn't really your own thinking.
- Always be honest and say when you've used Al—don't hide it or forget to mention it.

9.0 Sale, Distribution or Display of Publications or Leaflets

The sale, distribution or display of publications or leaflets within the College by you or others is prohibited unless prior authority has been obtained from designated members of the Senior Management Team.

- Take responsibility for catching up on missed work if you are absent.

- Attend all lessons, tutorials, and enrichment activities.
- Keep attendance above 95% and avoid holidays during term time.

Contribute Positively

- Avoid disrupting lessons or the college environment.
- Support your own learning and help maintain a positive atmosphere.
- Dispose of litter properly and eat only in designated areas.
- Follow health and safety rules on and off campus.

Act Safely

- Wear your college ID visibly at all times.
- Wear the appropriate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) at all times.
- Use the designated smoking/vaping areas and park vehicles safely.

Use Technology Responsibly

- Follow the College's IT and Acceptable Use policies.
- Do not share offensive or inappropriate content online.
- Keep login details private and avoid using others' accounts.

Use Al Ethically

- Only use AI tools where permitted and always acknowledge their use.
- Do not submit AI-generated content as your own original work.

Support a Safe College

- Report any concerns about your safety or others to staff.
- Never engage in bullying, harassment, or harmful behaviour.
- Do not bring drugs, alcohol, weapons, or gamble on campus.

Be a Good Community Member

- Be considerate of local residents when off-site.
- Represent the College positively in public and on social media



What we will not accept at COPC:

We will NOT accept:

- Any actions that violate Health & Safety regulations or create hazardous conditions.
- Any behavior that shows disrespect toward staff, students, or community members, or harms the College's reputation—including conduct while traveling to and from college.
- Any form of bullying or harassment.
- Possession or use of illegal drugs, related paraphernalia, or alcohol. Possession or use of illegal drugs and related items may lead to permanent exclusion.
- Assessment of misconduct, including plagiarism or unauthorised use of artificial intelligence.
- Misuse of College IT systems, including internet usage; all online activity is monitored and subject to restrictions and filtering.
- Smoking and/or vaping in unauthorized areas
- Eating and/or drinking (except water) during classes
- Gambling
- Dishonesty of any kind
